Transportation of intoxicating liquor.

On January 21, 1930, by prearrangement with one Alex Tabalich, Federal Prohibition Agents had Tabalich order a delivery of liquor from Hyman Chargo, to be delivered to a garage in the rear of 406 Maple Street, St. Paul, Minnesota.

Hyman Chargo appeared, driving a Chevrolet Sedan, and as it took the Agents a few minutes to reach the garage, defendant had already unloaded five five-gallon jugs of white moonshine whiskey, which were placed in the doorway of the garage. Defendant and one Jack Sinovich, who had been in the car with him, and Alex Tabalich were standing by the car, drinking moonshine whiskey out of a glass. The Chevrolet Sedan and the five five-gallon jugs of moonshine whiskey were seized.

Dear Sir:

Mr. Frank Loveland, Jr., Supervisor of Paroles, Department of Justice, Washington, D. C., has instructed this office to communicate with you in regards to obtaining your services as Parole Advisor for the above named prisoner, who was granted a parole at that November 1930 meeting of the Board of Parole, to become effective December 12th, 1930.

Charge is a white man, thirty eight years of age, serving a term of one year and one day, for violation of the National Prohibition Act, having been sentenced from the District of Minnesota, St. Paul. This is the first trouble of any nature that this man has ever been in. He has a wife (Mrs. Nina Charge) and four children living at 164 Robertson St., St. Paul, Minnesota, so he has a home to go to upon his release from this institution. He is a cap maker by trade, but is in good physical condition and able to do any kind of work. We have an affidavit in this office signed by Mr. O. Kessel President, National Banking Company, St. Paul, Minnesota, stating that upon Charge release that they will have employment for him. He will of course make his home in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Inasmuch as St. Paul the town in which the prisoner is to live and work in is some distance from Minneapolis, your headquarters, please give this office instructions as to how the parolee is to contact with you upon his arrival in St. Paul, and each month thereafter for the purpose of signing his parole reports.

Will you please acknowledge this letter with an expression as to your willingness to act as Parole Advisor for this man, at the earliest possible date.
