


Dear Sir:-



Sir:

In response to the attached letter, dated September 9th, 1930, from Mrs. Hymen Chargo, 164 Robertson Street, Saint Paul, Minnesota, in behalf of her husband, Hymen Chargo, our Register Number 36659, I wish to state that this man was received in this Institution on May 29th, 1930, from Saint Paul, Minnesota, to serve a sentence of 1 year and 1 day for a violation of the Volstead Act.

At the time of his admittance he represented himself as a married man and gave his Occupation as Cabinet Maker. His height was 5' 8½"; weight 167 pounds; posture, stooped. Initial examination made on May 30, 1930, was apparently negative in all respects.

At the present time, he is confined in the Main Hospital suffering from a Chronic Gastric ailment which we have been unable to diagnose correctly. However we will take a G. I. Series with a Fluoroscope of his stomach, as soon as possible, in order to arrive at a successful diagnosis. There is a possibility that he is suffering from a Peptic or Duodenal Ulcer which is not indicated by the Gastric Analysis; and he does not seem to be losing any weight. He is also suffering from an arrested Pulmonary Tuberculosis; Sputum Tests have all been negative. Fluoroscope of his chest shows no active tuberculosis.

This letter was referred to me for attention and I have had Dr. Bennett make me a report in the connection which is self-explanatory and which gives a full history of your husband's case and I am enclosing it herewith to you.

The thing for your husband to do is to make the best of his situation. He only makes it worse for himself when he worries about it and it would be much easier if he would quit worrying and you might advise him to this effect.

I will have him called to my office and have a talk with him myself and see what I can do with him.

Any further information you want us to furnish you in connection with your husband, you don't have to go to a lawyer to get it. We do not furnish information about prisoners to any others than near relatives and duly authorized officers of the law.
