# Pig's Eye plant told to clean up its act by 1988

A state agency decided Tuesday that the Pig's Eye sewage-treatment plant in St. Paul must discharge cleaner wastewater into the Mississippi Riv-

But the citizens' board of the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) gave the plant's operators until July 1988 to meet the more stringent standards. It also set tougher future limitations on the amounts of certain contaminants that can be present in the wastewater.

In another development, the MPCA board approved legal action against Ecolotech, Inc., which has hazard-ous-waste facilities in Minneapolis and St. Paul. The MPCA said the small company is improperly storing hundreds of barrels of corrosive wastes at those facilities.

The new operating permit for Pig's Eye, approved yesterday, follows the recommendations of Allan Klein, a state hearing examiner. He had rec-ommended tougher standards for wastewater discharged into the riv-

Pig's Eye is the state's largest sewage-treatment plant and treats about 85 percent of the sewage produced in the Twin Cities area. It is operated by the Metropolitan Waste Control Commission, a unit of the Metropoli-

In recent years the plant has had problems meeting MPCA wastewater standards. Downriver residents in Minnesota and Wisconsin have long contended that the wastewater pollutes a long stretch of the Mississip-

Last April, I'S. District Judge Diana Murphy dismissed a lawsuit brought by Wisconsin Attorney General Bron-son La Follette, who wanted to impose stricter control standards on the plant. Murphy ruled that Wisconsin should voice its concerns during hearings concerning renewal of the plant's operating permit. Klein presided over those hearings this year.

The MPCA noted yesterday that the

quality of the effluent discharged from the plant into the Mississippi has improved over the last year. It also noted that the waste control commission has begun a \$18 million project to install more advanced pollution-control equipment at the

Raymond Roder, a Wisconsin assistant attorney general, told the MPCA that his state supports the new operating permit. But he stressed that Wisconsin officials consider the permit's requirements to be "minimally sufficient to meet water-quality stan-

Under the permit, the two metro agencies must complete construction of new control equipment by April 10, 1985. They then must survey the river downstream from the plant to determine the effects of the new equipment on water quality.

A report on that survey must be submitted to the MPCA by 1986. The MPCA could require additional control measures if the equipment isn't doing an adequate job. The metro agencies have until July 1988 to take whatever steps are needed to meet the new standards.

The MPCA said Ecolotech has failed to obtain the required government permits for handling hazardous wastes at 2619 28th Av. S., Minneapolis, and at 769 Front Av., St. Paul. The company has accumulated several hundred barrels of wastes at those facilities to reclaim copper and other metals from those wastes.

Brian Carriere, a Minneapolis resident who owns the Ecolotech facilities, told the MPCA board that he has extracted 26 tons of copper from wastes over the last 10 years. He conceded that the two small facili-ties "may not be in the right neighborhoods.

While the MPCA approved legal action against Ecolotech, it said a lawsuit will not be necessary if Carriere agrees to pay a civil penalty and to clean up his operations. Earlier, the MPCA staff suggested he pay a \$8,000 penalty, but that is subject to

## **Metro Council approves** highway, transit program The Metropolitan Council has ap-

proved a three-year planning pro-gram for improving highway and transit systems in the seven-county area at a cost of \$720 million.

About \$519.5 million will be financed by federal agencies, which already have approved the bulk of the program. The balance will be financed by state gasoline tax revenue. Preparing a three-year plan is part of the process for receiving the federal

The program is updated annually and includes some projects that were in the 1982-1984 program, such as the 3rd Av. distributor in downtown Minneapolis, Interstate Hwy. 94 in Washington County and Interstate Hwy. 35E in Dakota County.

Two-thirds of the 250 projects are highways, primarily the completion of interstate highway segments. The rest are transit projects, including a \$59.8 million operating subsidy for for rehabilitating 175 buses. the Metropolitan Transit Commis-

The highway projects include \$5 million for the 3rd Av. distributor, \$19.7 million for I-94 in Washington County, and \$46.1 million for rebuilding Interstate Hwy. 494 near the airport in Bloomington and building another portion from Hwy. 149 in Eagan to South St. Paul.

Others are \$30.5 million for bridge construction on I-35E in Dakota County; \$7 million for widening the Interstate Hwy. 35W bridge over the Minnesota River between Burnsville and Bloomington; \$7 million for an interchange at Hwy. 100 and W. 36th St. in St. Louis Park, and \$9.4 million for Hwy. 610, the "Northtown Cross-town," and Hwy. 252 from Brooklyn Park to Coon Rapids.

Other transit expenditures for the MTC include \$19.7 for buying 62 ar-ticulated buses and 13 or 14 buses for Project Mobility and \$13 million

# Officials fix approximate time of death for shooting victim

Marion Dupey was killed by a bullet that was probably fired at random at about 1:50 a.m. Monday, officials said Tuesday.

"Our test results show that rigor mortis of the body began shortly after" a neighbor heard four gunshots, said Jim Essling, spokesman for the Ramsey County medical ex-aminer's office. "The neighbor said that he heard the shots just as he came home from work."

But despite being able to establish a probable time of death, St. Paul ho-micide detectives said yesterday they have no suspects in the case.

Dupey, 60, who lived with her husband, Clarence, and a son, Wade, was lying on her living room couch when a bullet pierced her forehead. Her son and her husband found her about 10 a.m.

street nearby causing them to be-lieve that the bullet was fired from there. The bullet passed through two doors before it struck her, they said. cond bullet was found in the

Although ballistic tests have not been completed, Essling said the bullet that killed Dupey may have been fired from a .38-callber automatic He said the time tentatively established for Dupey's death is strengthened by the fact that Clarence Dupey told police he woke up shortly before 2 a.m. because he thought he heard a loud knock at the front door.

Capt. Donald Troolen, head of the unit investigating the case, said police have "no real idea yet" ab how vandalism to the home on Sunday may be linked to the shooting. The windshield of the family's 1969 Mercury was smashed and a house window was broken.

## N.D. budget proposal includes tax increases

Gov. Allen Olson has proposed a 1cent increase in sales and motor vehicle excise taxes, designed to raise \$100 million, as part of his 1983-85 budget proposals.

He also gave legislators a list of five other taxes that might be raised, including individual and corporate income taxes, coal conversion taxes, cigarette and liquor taxes.

House Majority Leader Richard Backes predicted the Legislature would agree to a combination of income and sales tax increases. The sales tax would rise from 3 cents on the dollar to 4 cents.

## Attempt to halt waste site panel rejected

Carver County officials that he temporarily enjoin the state from looking for a site to dispose of hazardous chemical wastes.

In a decision to be released today. Judge Donald Barbeau of Hennepin County District Court ruled that Carver County's request is premature. He said the county had adequate opportunity over the last two years to challenge the Minnesota Waste Management Board's site-selection process, but instead recently opted to pursue a judicial remedy.

However, Barbeau stayed his decision until Jan. 17, saying that would give Carver County time to appeal its case to the Minnesota Supreme Court. The Carver County board last month sued the state board, which is required by state law to select at least one hazardous-waste disposal site by mid-1984. The county contended that its residents were denied their constitutional rights when the state board decided that two sites in the county appear safe for waste

The county asked Barbeau to order the waste board to reconsider each of 53 other sites scattered across

In his ruling, Barbeau said:

"For nearly two years the Carver sites have been under consideration and issues regarding (the site-selection) procedure had never been raised. Apparently, Carver was satisfied in its relationship with the board until the county realized that it might be chosen for a waste repository after all. Then it called 'foul.' "

Barbeau said that "In short, much time and procedure remains be-tween the urgency of Carver County's complaint and the finality of the (waste) board's decision" on a final

In addition to the two sites in Carver County, the board is considering one site each in Aitkin, Marshall and Scott counties. Also, the board this week is expected to drop one of the two Carver County locations from its list of potential sites.

## Man arrested in Eagan killing to be charged with murder

man described as despondent about losing his family and being unemployed is expected to be charged with murder today in the killing of an Eagan tool executive

The man, 34, of Apple Valley, was arrested on suspicion of killing James Shaw, 41, vice president of operations for Machine Tool Supply, Inc. His arrest followed a two-hour stand-off with police while he threatened to shoot himself.

Dakota County Attorney Robert Carolan said second-degree murder charges will be filed by noon today, when a 36-hour arrest hold will expire. A county grand jury will conble first-degree murder charges, he

Eagan police and Dakota County authorities offered few clues Tuesday as to why Shaw, who was married and had three children, was killed. Asked about a possible motive for the shooting, Mark Lystig, assistant county attorney, said, "We're not giving out information like that."

During the stand-off with police the man told officers that he had lost his job and family. Police said the man recently left the army and was un-employed. Neighbors said he joined the army after being unemployed for more than a year, since he was laid off by the Ford Co. He returned because his marriage had soured, they said. The couple has a daughter from the wife's previous marriage.

Shaw is survived by his wife, JoAnn, and three children, all living at home in Hopkins. He also is survived by his mother, Ruth Shaw, four brothers, and six sisters.

Visitation will be from 4 to 8 p.m. today at Strobeck-Johnson Funeral Chapel in Hopkins. The funeral will be at 10:30 a.m. Thursday at Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Hop-kins, with burial at Inman Cemetery near Henning, Minn.
